Trainfest 2018, our 47th show, fills the EXPO Center at State Fair Park with 64 manufacturers, 36 vendors, 55 layouts (Z -3, N – 7, HO - 29, S – 2, O - 5 STD – 1, LEGO - 2, G – 6), 13 Historical Societies and 22 Displays. We have 30 layouts participating in the Jr. Engineer program letting kids of all ages operate on their railroads.

This year's theme "Celebrate the Great Northern" includes a Historical Display and HO and N scale limited run Box Cars from Accurail and Micro Trains respectively.

Leading off was Jim Osborn, a member of the Fox Valley NMRA Division, who gave a presentation on how he implemented operating signals on his HO Scale CNW based layout. Jim's layout is built for operations and the signal system design was developed to insure smooth operations with minimal mistakes and conflicts.

Hal Miller, editor for Model Railroader magazine, then gave an overview of the project layouts that the magazine has built over the past 50 years. The pictorial presentation included details on why the different layouts were constructed. Of interest was the methods of construction which have greatly changed over the time period.

## Model Railroading - Try Just 15 Minutes a Day

Below is something I recently wrote on my HO scale

<u>Kingston Sub</u>\* layout Facebook page. Hopefully it resonates with some of you.

Last year, I hardly made it down to my model railroad room. It became more and more difficult to face what is supposed to be my favourite place in the world. Thinking about the gargantuan task that it is



to build the Kingston Sub would just cause me anxiety as I was so rarely down there and progress was so slow. It also caused me to question why I was in this hobby and why I was in this business if I never actually worked on my layout.

I turned 43 last month and I made a birthday resolution to try and spend 15 minutes a day in my layout room. That's it - just get down there for 15 minutes. Sometimes I can't get there - the logistics just don't allow it, like getting home from work at 10:30 p.m. But sometimes 15 minutes turns into 45 or more, which is a bonus. In the last three weeks I have definitely been down to the layout for more days than I've missed.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE! When I get to work on the layout, even just for 15 minutes, I go to bed feeling I have accomplished something. I actually sleep better than when I don't work on the layout. It's reduced my overall anxiety. My wife has noticed a difference. No more existential talks before bed (much to her relief).

I'm no longer so worried about the end result of the layout. When you get to work on the layout every day it becomes all about the process and the little accomplishments on the way. The end result becomes less and less important. I still have to travel for work and on those days, working on the layout will be impossible. But I am going to try to continue this new approach and get down to the layout room for just 15 minutes a day when I can. And then I hope to be able to update the Facebook page in real time and not just a couple of times a year.

I pray that I will have the strength and persistence to continue this new tradition. It's had an enormous impact on my outlook and overall quality of life.

## Jim's Tips and Tidbits

Not long ago I learned that one sure way to find out how much something you want to sell is worth is to sell it on E-bay, or in my case have someone else sell it on E-bay for you. I had several dozen N scale Kadee and Micro-Trains 50-foot boxcars to sell, and as expected most of them went for \$8-\$9. Two, though, really surprised me. One went for \$111 and the other for \$130. That happened because these cars were attractive to collectors. Most Kadee/M-T cars are not particularly valuable, but the collectors have their catalogs and the experience to know which cars are hard to find and which ones they need to fill out their collections. Collectors keep an eye on E-Bay and if you've listed something valuable, they'll soon find it. You don't have to know what it's worth because they do.





Ever wonder why almost all railroad cars and many structures before World War II were painted boxcar red? It was a matter of economy. The pigment, iron oxide, came straight from the ground, was easy to treat and mix with a vehicle, linseed oil, to make very durable paint.

## Railfan Alert...

The Soo Line Historical & Technical Society convention this year was in Stevens Point and included a tour of CN's local car repair facilities. During the presentation, it was mentioned that CN trains would be using "Air Cars" this winter on longer trains in Wisconsin. These cars have been used by many railroads for more than 10 years.

The CN cars are 40 foot boxcars equipped with a generator and compressor. The cars are placed mid-train to maintain brake line pressure during the winter months. So keep your eyes open—one car was in the Stevens Point yard painted orange.



On October 21<sup>st</sup> the WISE Division meet will be held in a **new location** and will have a **new format**. The meet will be held in the **Community Room at Lake Park** which is located directly beneath Bartalotta's Restaurant overlooking Lake Michigan. There is a parking lot right next to the restaurant which has several spaces dedicated for use by the Community Room participants. Sign up will start at 12:30 PM and the clinic will start at 1:00 PM and run until 3:15. There will be a contest but no swap tables at this meet and when the clinic is over, we will have layout tours from 4:00 to 5:30 pm.

The clinic will be a "HANDS ON" event. We will construct a 2' x 8' backdrop for a HO scale model railroad. You will need to bring scissors, a hobby knife with a new blade, a straight edge and a cutting board. In addition to the above items, you can bring colored pictures of structures. They can be cut out of magazines, kit boxes, catalogs, or be blown up photographs printed on a color printer or pieces of commercially printed backdrops. They should be approximate HO scale or smaller. I will provide the rest of the needed materials.

#### **Simplify your Terminal Wiring**

Assuming you are not running battery powered trains, at some point you need to provide power to the track and the accessories that make your layout come alive. The span of my hobby involvement is nearly 45 years and a lot has changed since the early days of DC block control with DPDT toggle switches controlling the power routing to each track block. Now, especially with DCC, you need a quality power bus with plenty of track feeders to insure smooth operation.

Up until several years ago, I was using large heavy duty terminal strips. These were bulky and fairly expensive. A couple of years ago I stumbled on a nifty little lever connector made by Wago of Germantown, WI. The specific connector I found works



like a terminal block with 5 lever locks to provide the power connection. The slots can handle up to 12 gauge wire, or if you use smaller gauge wire like I do on my N-Scale layout, you can easily connect up to 20 feeders with one lever connector. The connectors come in bulk quantity as well so you won't break the bank with your terminal wiring projects.

Wago makes a variety of pressure fit and lever style connectors that can really simplify the wiring process. Do a little research on the internet to find the best solution for your project. They are availa-

ble at most home improvement and hardware stores, Amazon and E-Bay. With a little research you can find the right one for your wiring job. A typical track feeder connector block using the Wago lever connectors is shown at the right.
