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
March to Oconomowoc

The WISE March 2019 Meet will be held at the Oconomowoc Historical Society Museum. It will be a special day as they commemorate the completion of the majority of the train layout. The group will also be hosting the clinics and layout tours at that Meet. Below is a summary of the last major project submitted by Harry Evans.

"A few years ago we completed a major expansion of the Milwaukee North Western at the Oconomowoc Historical Society & Museum. At the time we talked of having a Golden Spike as we thought we had completed such a major area, but we never did have the event. Then in early 2018 as we contemplated what would be our next challenge, one of our members, George Robbins, pointed out there still remained a large area (Butler Terminal) that had never been reworked, and still wasn't operable, still a lot of brass track from 70 years ago, etc. We pondered for a bit and then decided "let's do it", and so the project commenced. What had once been the state of the art of model railroading still looked OK but also very tired and in need of a substantial updating.

We started on the Butler Terminal project in March, 2018, at least in terms of drawing lines on paper. Then a few months ago we were contacted by WISE to ask if we might like to host a meeting this year and March was decided for the meet. In preparation and in more discussions in our group, and in light of the UP/CP Golden Spike Ceremony at Promontory Point, UT, in May, 2019, it seemed fitting to attempt a Golden Spike of our own on the museum railroad as part of the March meeting. Getting the Butler Terminal up and running is our goal and we are more than half way there at this time. We are determined to be operational for March.

So...please come and be a part of the Golden Spike ceremony at the Oconomowoc museum. In addition to the Golden Spike there will be clinics relating to the railroad's design and operations theory. As typical for WISE meets, there will be the usual model contests and a swap session area."

our hobby, glue is probably one of the most basic and fundamental tools we need. The proper selection and use of glues has a major impact on what we construct, with bad choices not showing their incorrect outcomes sometimes for years. I enjoy scratch-building and scenery construction so I thought I would share my thoughts on some of the glues I use and for what. While space limits me at this time, let me know if you are interested in a more in-depth overview and I will be happy to put on a clinic at one of the meets.

- White glue—great for scenery especially when diluted.
- Yellow carpenter's glue—use for scenery construction such as roadbed and foam layers. This glue resists letting go when it gets wet from scenery construction. It is also my preference for scratch-building with wood.
- Styrene Welder—a must if you are assembling styrene kits or scratch-building. There are several brands out there; I am currently using one called Flex-I-File.
- Quick grab adhesive such as Loctite Power Grab. Works great for benchwork construction, foam scenery layers and more. It works great when you have to get something to set up quickly in position.
- Canopy glue—while it's primary application is for working with model aircraft glazing, it works great in bonding plastic/styrene to any other substrate, and it dries clear. Great for applying windows to buildings.
- CA (super glue) most of us know this one. I use a medium set thick grade to give me work time. Use an accelerator spray to get it to set quickly.
- Woodland Scenics Accent Glue—probably the best glue for placing figures and features in your scenery—they remove easily!
- Walthers GOO a great all around glue, but needs a little time to set up. Warning—don't use this on foam without testing first.

What's going on?

A lot of you may know that a Chinese factory closed its doors a few months ago and that has created a problem for our model railroad industry.

In short, that company manufactured products for just about every American company in the business, from the biggest, like Athearn and Atlas, to the smallest. There are other Chinese companies that manufacture model railroading products, but most American companies are scrambling to find new suppliers. This will take some time and we're going to be going through a dry spell when your dealer has fewer new items to sell. Obviously this is not a good thing, as new products whet our appetites for new projects.

I recently had lunch with Hal Miller, editor of Model Rail-roader magazine, and he had no news on this topic. Some manufacturers prefer to say little about it for fear of alarming customers. Others just don't have any news to report. Seems to me such information would be proprietary and you woundn't want your competition to know of avenues you're exploring. Meanwhile we'll just have to be patient. Thankfully we N scalers still have our MicroTrains and HOers have their Kadee, made right here in the good old USA.

Why Milwaukee?

Ever wonder why autos were made in Detroit, Butterfingers were made in Chicago? Or why Milwaukee became the model railroad mecca? Sometimes industries are started because of resources, water in particular, but often they happen because of people that live there. Detroit happened largely because of Henry Ford. Butterfingers, Baby Ruths, and the Curtis Candy company were created by Otto Schnering (bet you didn't know that).

And in Milwaukee Al Kalmbach founded Model Railroader magazine in 1934. Bill Walthers had already been making model railroading products for several years and in 1935 the NMRA was founded right here.

Banning black

If I had my way, no railroad would have ever painted anything black. I have an N scale Norfolk Southern engine and two Scale Trains carbon hoppers that are black holes on the layout. It'll take some careful dry-brushing and weathering to make them visible.

What You Need to Know About the New Tax Bill

It was supposed to be a tax bill that would substantially simplify tax returns and provide tax relief across the board, benefiting in some way all taxpayers. While it didn't quite get there as far as tax simplification, the Tax Cut and Jobs Act that was just passed by Congress does cut taxes for the vast majority of Americans. Just how much any particular tax payer benefits depends on a number of factors, including the amount of taxable earnings and itemized deductions, marital status, family status and the state of residency. For many Americans, the tax bill gives and takes through various provisions that, on a net-basis, results in less taxes owed. Here are some of the key provisions and the way they help or hurt taxpayers.

Lower Tax Brackets

Original versions of the bill sought to simplify taxes by reducing the number of tax brackets from seven to three or four. That was lost along the way to producing the final tax bill which keeps the number at seven, but many of the marginal tax rates have been adjusted downward. The top rate dropped from 39.6 percent to 37 percent and most income levels will be taxed at lower rates. The downside is that the tax brackets are now linked to an inflation index, which will push many taxpayers into higher brackets over time.

Double the Standard Deduction

Perhaps the bigger news is the doubling of the standard deduction from \$12,000 to \$24,000 for married couples (\$6,000 to \$12,000 for single filers). That is significant for taxpayers who don't itemize or whose itemized deductions don't exceed the lower threshold. These taxpayers are the most likely to realize a tax reduction. For those who do itemize, the tax reduction could be much less and some could end up owing more in taxes.

Lower Mortgage Interest Deduction Cap

Under current tax law, the mortgage deduction is capped at \$1 million of mortgage indebtedness. The new tax bill lowers the cap to \$750,000 so, although it will affect more homeowners, it won't impact most. Homes purchased before December 15, 2017 will be grandfathered for the \$1 million cap. In addition, the tax deduction for interest on home equity loans has been eliminated except in cases where the proceeds have been used for significant home improvements.

SALT Deduction Remains with a Cap

The provision that caused most of the controversy was the elimination of the tax deduction for state and local taxes. Originally, the provision was to be eliminated altogether, but the final bill keeps it with a cap of \$10,000 of state and local income, sales and property taxes.

Personal Exemption Gone

Everyone loves the personal exemption – the amount each individual is able to use to reduce their taxable income. Families especially loved it because the exemption was available for each dependent. The new tax bill eliminates the personal exemption. With the doubling of the standard deduction and the larger child tax credit, most taxpayers will still come out on top.

Child Tax Credit Doubles and Access Expands

The child tax credit has been increased from \$1,000 to \$2,000. More families will qualify for the credit because the phase out has also been increased for married couples from \$110,000 to \$400,000. The first \$1,400 is refundable for people who owe zero taxes.

Alternative Minimum Tax Still Here

One way the original tax bill was supposed to simplify taxes was by eliminating the alternative minimum tax. The final version keeps AMT, but it increases the threshold from \$86,200 to \$109,400 so AMT will impact fewer taxpayers.

No More Marriage Penalty

Under the new law, married taxpayers will pay taxes at the same tax rate as individual filers. For example, if two individuals each earned \$150,000 under the old law they would be in the 28 percent bracket. If they got married, their \$300,000 combined income would boost them into the 33 percent bracket. Under the new law, the couple would be in the 24 percent bracket – same as an individual earning \$150,000.

Larger Medical Deduction

For taxpayers who do itemize, more medical expenses will be deductible. The new tax bill lowers the adjusted gross income (AGI) floor for medical deductions to 7.5 percent from 10 percent and it will be retroactive to the 2017 tax year. For example, a married couple with \$100,000 AGI can start deducting medical expenses above \$7,500 instead of \$10,000.

You Lose Some Deductions

The tax bill eliminates several deductions, including just about everything that was categorized as "miscellaneous deductions," which included items such as unreimbursed employee expenses and tax preparation fees. You'll still be able to deduct charitable contributions and student loan interest.

Larger Estate Tax Exemption

The bill's authors originally wanted to eliminate the estate tax altogether, but the final bill only included an increase in the amount that would be exempt from estate taxes. The new exemption is doubled to \$22.4 million for married couples (\$11.2 million for individuals).

There is a lot to absorb from the new tax bill. Be sure to meet with a tax professional to ensure you understand how the new tax law will impact your specific tax situation.



October Popular Vote Contest Results


There was plenty of competition in the popular vote contest at the October Meet, but only in two categories—Structures and the General Category.
